The Kinetic Family Drawing (KFD) was developed by Burns and Kaufman in 1970. Children are asked to draw their family doing something rather than given the general instruction to just draw their family; the difference of asking a child to include the family acting or doing something was a huge development to this assessment tool.

Kinetic Family Drawing - Psychological Assessment in ...

Kinetic Family Drawing asks the child to draw his or her family doing something, while Kinetic School Drawing asks for a picture of the child interacting with relevant school figures. The introduction of action increases the diagnostic information available in the drawings, providing more insight into the child's feelings and functioning.

III. Kinetic Family Drawing Present a piece of plain, white 8.5x11-inch paper at an angle to the subject and say: "Here I want you to draw you and your family all doing something together. It can be anything you want." Use these questions as a guide: *Do they get along? Who is the person? How old are they? What's their favorite thing to do?

Children are asked to draw a picture of their family, including themselves, "doing something." Kinetic Family Drawing (KFD; Burns & Kaufman, 1970), a widely used projective drawing assessment test to measure family dynamics, is a promising test for cultural studies. It was developed in the United States by two American authors, Burns and Kaufman, who empirically defined the criteria of analysis over several years.

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
